

# How to Run a Stress-Free Book Club

#### "Ladies of the Club" celebrates 25 years of talking about good books

In September 1997, Jennifer Conlon found herself with a network of fellow readers, women in her neighborhood in various careers.

"We wanted to exercise our brains in a different way, regardless of what we did for a living," she said. They formed a book club and recently published a booklet of their 25 years as a club. Starting with 12 members, seven of whom are still in the club, they are now a group of around 15.

## Conlon said there are several things they do that may contribute to their longevity:

• Develop a system that gives each member a voice in what's read. Make a list of all the suggestions for the coming year. Members get a certain number of votes to cast; the top eight selections are put on a list, and whoever hosts the next meeting gets to pick which book they read and discuss.

• **Stick to a consistent schedule.** They kickoff a new "season" every September, and meet the first Wednesday of the month, with eight meetings a year.

• Keep the number of members somewhat small. "Small enough that people will be missed if they aren't there," said Conlon. A smaller group can also make it less intimidating for people to host a meeting.

• **Try to include different genres.** Avoid reading the same author twice. Look to work in a Chicagobased story now and then.

• Start the discussion with a short recap of the plot, followed by softball questions. Who was your favorite character and why? What was your favorite part of the book? Did you like the ending? These get people warmed up and thinking about the plot and other elements of the book.

• **Keep the pressure off.** Don't make people feel like they can't give up on a book. As any librarian worth their salt will tell you, sometimes it's just not worth the time to finish a book you really don't like.

• Use the Library to get reading materials. Conlon said they will use the Library's Book Club collection for some selections, and some members rely on ebooks and audiobooks which are often available through the Library's digital services.

#### The Perks of Registering Your Book Club

When you register your book club with us, your group can keep the books longer so that they are due 2 days after your discussion.
You'll have access to our book discussion sets, which include popular titles that can be difficult to get otherwise.

• Your club can reserve sets in advance, so members can pick up their books at the Reader Services desk about 4 weeks in advance of your meeting, according to Rachel, a Reader Services librarian who manages the collection alongside Sarah R., a library assistant.

• We try to offer new titles monthly to keep your options fresh.

• If your book club has a mix of needs, we often order large print books and audiobooks for

clubs. We can't reserve ebooks or e-audiobooks, but we can check availability in Hoopla, Overdrive/ Libby, and Axis360.

"We are always so impressed by how many book clubs there are in Park Ridge, and how long so many of them have been meeting!" said Rachel. "We are here to help if any clubs need assistance." 

## **Park Ridge Classic Film Series: The Lubitsch Touch**

"What about Lubitsch?" asked one of our film series regulars, suggesting a theme.

The younger generation might ask, "Who was Lubitsch?" We will answer that question in detail this spring when the Park Ridge Public Library Classic Film Series returns for its thirteenth season. "The Lubitsch Touch" will profile the great German director Ernst Lubitsch (1892-1947), one of the most respected filmmakers of the 20th century.

Our three-month program will cover Lubitsch's post-Germany career, beginning with his first American film, *Rosita* (1923), on March 2. This Mary Pickford silent epic will be presented with a special (digital) organ accompaniment by Jay Warren at 7 PM. Lubitsch made his mark in the early sound era with the musical genre. We'll have all his best starring Maurice Chevalier and Jeanette MacDonald, the culmination of which will be a screening of the comic operetta *The Merry Widow* (1934) on April 13. Code films such as the rather amoral *Trouble in Paradise* (1932) on March 30, which was one of our biggest hits when we played it in 2010. Though we've presented many comedy programs over the years, this time we delve into a more sublime, sophisticated realm of humor. Lubitsch was a master of innuendo, and he never told his stories in an obvious way. It's these qualities that give his films their special touch.

We'll have Greta Garbo laughing in *Ninotchka* (1939) on April 20 and James Stewart and Margaret Sullavan bickering in the beloved *The Shop Around the Corner* (1940) on April 27, followed by *To Be or Not to Be* (1942) on May 18, Lubitsch's war-time black comedy starring Jack Benny and Carole Lombard (in her final film).

For anyone who loves the movies—or dreams of making them—this series is a must-see. Who was Lubitsch? Simply put, Lubitsch was cinema.

All presentations start at 7 p.m. with an introduction by program host Matthew C. Hoffman. Doors open at 6:30 p.m. Screenings are free; no registration required. Visit parkridgeclassicfilm.com for more information.



Malaika told us she first learned of the challenge when she saw a sign at the library. Her favorite genres are romance, comedy, fantasy and mystery "because they [offer] another world of excitement...it gives me a thrill to read more."

Malaika offered this tip for establishing and growing your reading habit:

## "At night, before going to bed, read at least one page and increase it each day."

Malaika said she reads every day afternoon for 30 minutes, then does homework, and then reads before bed. At some point, reading before going to bed became a habit; she said she has a hard time falling asleep without reading. 

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
