Get Notified by Text

Do you get hundreds of emails every day? Do your Library reminders get buried among the sales ads? We have a solution for you. You can now get notified by text message reminders for returns, late notices and holds. To sign up go to the "Get Involved" tab on the home page and click on "Notifications."

NEW Catalog and Self-check System

Polaris—We are moving to a new online catalog in April. Our consortium, Cooperative Computer Services (CCS) and its 24 member public libraries, is moving to the Polaris integrated library system. Polaris is designed to enhance the patron experience with improved self-service features and a user-friendly interface. As part of this switch, the Library catalog will be off line for about one week during April. Patrons will need to have their Library cards to check out materials during the switch to Polaris. *Check our website for updates.*

Self-service Checkout—To coincide with the change to Polaris, we will be adding self-check kiosks during the renovation. They use radio-frequency identification (RFID) technology for identification and tracking purposes, making borrowing library items a breeze.

Getting to Know... Carol Pinson: Assistant Technical Services Department Manager

Ave you ever considered how books and other library items get on the shelves and ready for you to borrow? Carol Pinson, a 15-year veteran of PRPL with a Bachelor of Science in Chemistry from Wheaton College and a Master of Library Science from Dominican University, is part of the behind the scenes team of librarians working to make this happen.

Her myriad responsibilities include verifying catalog information, importing records from the international library database (OCLC) and assigning call numbers, and keeping the serials holdings records current. She ensures that everyone can find the items within our collection. As assistant department manager, Carol keeps track of the workflows in Technical Services and adjusts them as needed to keep new items flowing out to our patrons in a timely manner and have old items discarded.

What is your favorite book/author?

I'm not sure I have a favorite book and author. I like to read mysteries and am excited when I find a new series that I like and haven't read. (I did enjoy *Harry Potter*.) Right now I'm reading some Mrs. Jeffries mysteries by Emily Brightwell; I look for new mysteries by Joanne Fluke and JoAnna Carl; and I like the *No. 1 Ladies' Detective Agency* mysteries by Alexander McCall Smith.

LIBRARY RENOVATION

We are firmly committed to the Library renovation. While the construction has been delayed in the permit process, the Board has been working closely with the city and architects to move this project forward. Once permits are approved, we anticipate beginning work as quickly as possible. *Please check our website for updates as well as any changes in scheduled programs.*

Once work begins, the process will take five to six months. Work will be done in phases so the Library can remain open throughout the project. However, we may have to close for a few days while work is being done on the lobby and restrooms.




