





Park Ridge Public Library Assistant Circulation Manager, Matthew C.
Hoffman, hosts the tenth Classic Film Series this March through mid-April.\* This year's series leaves the confines of Hollywood cinema and journeys across the pond to explore the golden age of British comedy through the films of Ealing Studios, the oldest continuously working film studio in the world. Though they made films of all genres, including filming of *Downton Abbey* scenes, we will be highlighting the comedies from the late 1940s through the mid-1950s.

The humor in these films ranges from the

subtle and delicate to the downright bizarre.

Ealing Studios had an abundance of talent both in front of and behind the camera. Producer Sir Michael Balcon's films often vividly depict post-war London, typically showing the triumph of the underdog with stories that were predominantly character-driven. They are engaging, witty, and evocative of time and place, as well as providing a fair share of satire and social commentary. Four of the films in our program were shot by the cinematographer Douglas Slocombe, who later worked on the *Indiana Jones* films.

Comedy genius Peter Sellers made an appearance in the heist film *The* Ladykillers—later remade in 2004 with Tom Hanks. But the one actor that is most associated with Ealing at this time is Sir Alec Guinness—best known to us as Obi-Wan Kenobi from the Star Wars films. Before becoming a Jedi Knight, Guinness was one of the most diversified and distinguished actors in the business. He appears in five of our six films, playing a timid bank clerk in The Lavender Hill Mob, an inventor in The Man in the White Suit, and the rather creepy "Professor" in *The* Ladykillers. In the black comedy Kind Hearts and Coronets, he portrayed eight characters of a doomed family!

Though decidedly English in tone and manner, the Ealing comedies are nonetheless universal in their appeal. Their influence cannot be underestimated. Any quirky British comedy made today featuring an ensemble cast is often compared to these classics of seventy years ago.

- Have new materials automatically renewed three days before they are due and receive an email notification with the new due date or a reminder if they are not renewable.
- Select your notification preference, including email, text or automated calls.
- Choose your preferred pickup location from any of the 29 participating libraries.



We apologize in advance for downtime during the transition and ask for your patience and cooperation.

### April 9 - 20

- As we transition, no new releases be added to the catalog after April 8.
- After the transition, new materials will be entered into the system as quickly as possible.

### Before April 12

- Place your holds before the transition.
- If you previously opted in to save your checkout history or reading lists, download or print them by this date. You can link to instructions on the website.
- Visit the Circulation desk to make sure your account is up-to-date.

## **NEW** Library Catalog Coming Week of April 16



### April 14 - 16

- Bring your library card with you to the library! We may not be able to look up your account to check out materials to you.
- Call us to confirm that an item is on the shelf. As we transition from one system to another, results in the online catalog may not be up to date.
- Library staff will not be able to place holds nor will you be able to log into the library catalog to place holds.
- Please refrain from returning materials. We will automatically extend due dates and items will remain on your library card until we are live on the system.

### **April 17 & AFTER**

- Your library PIN or password will transfer over to the new system in all CAPS. For example, if your PIN is currently mypin1, it will be MYPIN1 in the new catalog.
- Place holds and return your items after this date.
- Remember to change any bookmarks you have to our new catalog.
