# Marion's Mark

#### The Sitkiewicz family

A resident of Park Ridge for nearly five decades before succumbing to ALS (Lou Gehrig's disease), Marion Sitkiewicz loved adventure and learning. When not travelling to far-flung locations with her husband, Don, a former Park Ridge alderman, Marion was always finding new ways to fuel her passion for life-long learning.

To celebrate Marion's memory, her family created "Marion's Mark." The four-part outreach program focuses on learning, growing, sharing and creating by donating resources to the Library for activities they knew she would have enjoyed sharing with others.

Marion's Mark will fund: the expansion of the Library's existing "Reading to the Dogs" program, giving new young readers confidence by practicing reading out loud to therapy dogs; a series of cultural exchange programs; and monthly art classes where patrons can experiment with new crafts. The program will also provide "Little Free Libraries" at various locations around Park Ridge. These neighborhood book exchanges—"take a book, return a book"— support a vision of a world where neighbors know each other by name, and everyone has access to books.

And, when renovation of the Library is complete, patrons can enjoy the fireplace, funded by Marion's Mark, in the Library's Quiet Reading Room.

Park Ridge is a community that shows its passion by giving back both financially and through volunteering. In this issue we share the stories of a few of the many individuals who, by sharing what they believe in, help make Park Ridge a strong, vibrant community.

## Renovation Update – Phase 3

We are now well into the final phase of construction. While the renovated second floor has been completed, it is also the temporary home of the Children's department and Circulation. We are excited about the end result!

#### What You Can Expect During Phase 3 - October to Late 2018

- The entire first floor is closed—during this time the Library entrance is off of Touhy.
- Circulation is near the second floor entrance.
- The Children's Department is located in the Quiet Reading Room and parts of that collection have been placed in storage to accommodate the smaller space.
- New columns will be installed at the Prospect Ave. entrance.
- Seating will be limited.
- The new Media Lab will coninue to house public computers.
- The Media Lab equipment, typewriter, low-vision equipment and microfilm viewer are not available.




